HOW YOUR MONEY IS SPENT

Over the last 12 years or so, the Friends have donated significant sums to the Home – a précis of the major donations is given below.

1999/2002	£1.35m towards the reconstruction of
	the Home, including new kennels

2004/5	£300k towards vets' fees
2006	£450k towards the 2 new circular

2007	£156k towards vets' fees

In addition, the Friends also funded some smaller projects at the Home. For 2011/2012, the Friends have agreed to donate £500,000 towards the second cattery/isolation unit which we hope will be built in 2012. We have also agreed to fund the salary for an additional behaviourist for a year at a cost of £15,000 and £14,000 for new doors for the new kennels and runs.

A YEAR WITH KARLA - ANN & MICHAEL TREVANION

In November 2010 we visited the Cats Home for a coffee morning. Our last cat from the home had died the previous April, and we had decided not to have any more pets as we are now in our 70s. However, after the coffee we couldn't resist a look around the cattery! There was this poor very thin female cat with prominent bones, patches of missing fur, a sizeable operation scar and a very loud voice. The cage label announced that she was a 14 year old stray called Karla. My husband was immediately smitten, and so (rather unwillingly) I was persuaded to enter our details on the application form on the way out. "It will speed things up if you decide to go ahead" said the receptionist. "No chance" I thought!

The winter was very cold last year and my husband kept up a constant barrage of remarks "I wonder if that poor old cat is still there?" "It's so cold for that poor old cat; she should be in a home" etc.

One day he was late home from University swimming and I wasn't surprised to find he had detoured into the Cats Home – and yes she was still there. So, rather unwillingly I agreed she should come to us, and she arrived in mid December (after home visits etc). Because of her age we agreed to a regular pattern of visits to the Home vets for blood tests etc.

On arrival she seemed surprisingly calm, but the next day she was roaming around the house wailing like a banshee! Thinking she was dying we gave her our undivided attention; almost 24/7, and in time the truth emerges – she is TOTALLY DEAF! Although we have always had cats this is a completely new experience for us. Luckily we live at the end of a cul-de-sac so traffic is minimal. Nevertheless, I leaflet all neighbours warning them to drive very carefully and give her a wide berth – despite the fact that I have not yet let her out.

The time comes (mid January) when she is desperate to get through the closed cat flap – so we bite the bullet, open the cat flap and off she goes. An hour and a half later she has still not returned, I'm becoming increasingly anxious when I see her strolling along the road opposite, tail vertical – queen of her patch! I'm so excited I run down stairs, slip on the hall floor, fall and jar my back (which was broken the previous year) badly, resulting in pain for the next 2 weeks. Never mind – she is worth it – I think! That first excursion into the great wide world was her one big adventure, as subsequently she has declined to go out at all; unless to do the necessary or accompany one of us into the garden.

The Home vets had quickly diagnosed a thyroid problem, (so she will always need tablets). Because of the dire state of her (few remaining) teeth, a dental procedure is recommended, which involves a general anesthetic – a risky procedure for an elderly frail cat. However, over the months she steadily gains weight, her fur grows wonderfully thick, and we learn to interpret her (now wide range) of miaows. Consequently, in October we agree to the dental. We are warned that she may not survive the anesthetic, but the news is good and we are invited to collect her that same day. We are told that she will be quite unwell for a couple of days, but Karla is a "tough old bird". On arrival at home she strolls, somewhat unsteadily, out of her basket heading straight for her food. I know it's preferable that she should not eat, but after an hour of constant miaowing I give in and she gobbled up a sachet of food, went to sleep and woke up the next day "good as new". I was amazed to find, when we took her for a check up, that she had several stitches in her gums – how

could she have eaten that first night?

Since her dental she appears to have become friendlier – could it be that her (presumably) much more comfortable mouth makes her more confident? Previously she would never sit closer than about 1 metre to us, now she jumps onto our laps at the least opportunity.

For our part, we have learned:-

- 1. Never to approach her from behind, (it's a big shock for a deaf cat);
- 2. Not to reach out to stroke her head she immediately ducks and runs away (presumably remembered behaviour from her past life);
- 3. To interpret her wide range of miaows, which tell us anything from the fact that she's hungry to she wants a game with her favourite ping pong ball. (This cat is supposed to be 15 now, but plays ball like a kitten);
- 4. Not to let her rule our lives too much!



As you see from the photograph, she is now a well covered, contented old lady, and we are glad she is sharing her old age with us.
