## **Queen of the Courtesans**

Congratulations to a member of the Friends' Executive and Fundraising Committees, *Dr Barbara White*, on the publication of her recent book *Queen of the Courtesans: Fanny Murray*. Murray, who was born in 1729, was the daughter of an impoverished musician in Bath but rose to become one of the most famous courtesans of her day. On the way, she had a string of famous lovers including Richard 'Beau' Nash, the Master of Ceremonies at Bath, John Montagu 4th Earl of Sandwich, the highwayman, James Maclaine and perhaps even a member of the royal family.

The most famous story about Fanny is that when she was having breakfast with one of her lovers, Sir Richard Atkins, she complained to him of being short of money. Sir Richard immediately gave her a

£20 note (about £2,400 in today's money). Fanny looked at him and said, 'Damn your twenty pound! what does it signify?'. She then promptly clapped it between two slices of bread and butter and ate it. The original Atkins diet perhaps!!

Barbara's biography has received much national attention, particularly in *The Times* and *The Daily Mail* where it was described as 'well written and enjoyable' and as a 'vividly detailed picture of 1750s London that suggests a very modern overlap of sex, celebrity, wealth and scandal'.

Barbara is donating a signed copy of her book to the Friends' Christmas Raffle this year.

**Megan's story**I volunteer dog-walked for Bath in 2001 after my previous Collie had died. My husband was working in Corsham and I used the time he was working to help out at Bath Cats & Dogs Home. I was keeping an eye out for a Collie to adopt but hadn't seen one that "spoke to me". I first saw Heidi cowering under a bench while I was on my way to walk a lurcher. It was December 2001 and one of the volunteer dog walkers was exercising the smaller dogs. Heidi wasn't a small dog but had been kennelled in the Small Dog block. This lady couldn't coax Heidi out from under the bench so I went to help her, knelt down to have a look and came face to face with a dog that "spoke to me". We adopted Heidi (she was "about three") and renamed her Megan (named by Bath Cats & Dogs Home as Heidi because she hid such a lot) as she had been a stray in Wales and Megan is such a Welsh name - my husband couldn't face calling out "Heidi" to her!

We had a long struggle to gain her trust, there was so much she hadn't experienced and so much that she had experienced that terrified her. She didn't understand buses, sirens, saucepans, kitchen foil or the TV and was terrified of babies, children, footballs, bikes, skateboards, etc., etc. Throughout her life, she has only really been happy and relaxed when it was just me, my husband and her all together in her home.

We had her vaccinated for rabies and have taken her abroad nine times in the twelve years that we have had her. She has travelled through France, Spain and Italy, initially by car and more recently in our motorhome. We have lived in Cornwall since 2007 and she has really taken to beach walks and has many friends, both furry and human. She has adapted very well to lots of changes and her confidence has built up over the years so that now, she soon becomes acclimatised to new circumstances.

In February this year she suffered a severe stroke. She could barely walk, couldn't feed herself, could only drink with lots of dribbling, fell over lots of times and her head was tilted over completely to the right. The vet offered to put her to sleep but suggested we try to treat her as she had been so lively just a few days before. She was put on Vivitonin, I hand-fed her chicken breast and pasta and slept downstairs with her. Within a couple of days, she was eating by herself, was steadier on her feet, her eyes had stopped flickering and she was sleeping through the night and a lot of the day too. Within fifty days she was 99% back to normal, where she has remained (the 1% is only a bit of dribbling and sometimes focussing on where a treat is in someone's hand). She did, however, suffer somewhat from arthritis before the stroke and obviously still suffers from that now. She is on Metacam for that and it's manageable. We are planning on taking the motorhome to the west coast of France this year (not going too far away

because of her) and I will get some more Vivitonin from the vet to ensure rapid treatment if it should recur.

She has been a challenge and, even now when she is much quieter, I still can't be complacent when we are out walking. We love her to bits, she has been such a pleasure to share our life with and if I had a £1 for every time she has made me smile, I would be a multi-millionaire! We are so grateful to have found her at Bath. I don't know how much longer we will have her with us, every day is a bonus.

I attach a photo of the three of us taken on the beach. I hope you've enjoyed reading about her, it's been a pleasure to write it. With very best wishes to everybody involved with Bath Cats & Dogs Home.

#### ANNE MEDDICK RETIRES

been a loyal supporter of the Friends for some twenty years, retired this summer as Membership Secretary of the Friends. Over the years, all Friends will have received correspondence from Anne, either receiving information packs on the Friends or renewal notices and reminders, but beyond this, most of you will have little idea of the depth of Anne's involvement with the Friends and Bath Cats & Dogs Home.



Anne remembers the days when Mr Doveton Gerty and Val Cooper ran the Home's office from a makeshift Portakabin just inside the gates of the site. Anne and others, including Friends' committee member Anita Hallam, operated out of an old garage with Anne manning the phones. It struck the more enterprising among this pioneering team, that there was nowhere at the Home for visitors in search of a companion animal, to even get a drink of water! Anne made use of the contacts she had made during her business career to make regular visits to local cash and carry stores to stock up on cans of Coke, Mars bars and Kit-Kats. Stacked high on the Portakabin counters, these went down a storm. Next, an ice-cream fridge was procured which was even more popular, especially on Open Days. It was from these humble beginnings that the immensely successful retailing arm of the Home began.

Anne also remembers the move to the super new reception centre at the Home and the moment Chris Pope, the then Chairman of the Trustees, presented her with the keys of the new shop saying, "here's your empty shop, now you can fill it up". Anne jumped at the challenge and managed to combine ordering everything from refreshments to dog leads and cat litter, to running the shop and continuing with her old job of manning the phones.

Taking a jump through the years, Anne also remembers the Friends' Westgate Street adventure into charity shopping. In particular, she remembers the wonderful Dame Margaret, all dressed up with yellow balloons and ribbons, riding through the streets of Bath in the back of a convertible car. With her royal wave, Dame Margaret was great for publicity. The shop was, recalls Anne, great fun, even though it involved lots of hard work for the Friends' faithful volunteers.

For Anne, the innumerable clothes sales, jumble sales, plant sales and Open Days have filled up the years and continue to do so. It is only failing health, among other factors, that has finally decided Anne that it is now time to retire. The Friends, says Anne, have been part of her life for such a long time, and they are times she will never forget.

In her reminiscences, Anne has been selfless in paying tribute to the many Friends and volunteers  $\,$ 

who have given freely of their time in order to raise money for the animals, all of whom she describes as "tireless [heroes and] heroines". Well, now is the time to recognise another tireless heroine. Anne Meddick herself. She has offered years of devoted service to the Home and the Friends and worked indefatigably to raise money for the cause and to improve animal welfare, for which we are all immensely grateful. We wish her well in her retirement - she will be greatly missed by everyone in the Friends.



## CHAIRMAN'S SPONSORED ZIP SLIDE

long and reaching a speed of 115mph.

Looking for innovative ways to raise funds for the Friends, I hit upon a way to indulge my desire to do something exciting whilst raising money. Having previously done a sponsored Sky Dive and Abseil I thought it might be worth doing a Zip Slide and chose the Velocity Zip Slide at Bethesda in North Wales, in the heart of Snowdonia. The zip wire goes over the Penrhyn Slate Quarry, which is the largest manmade hole in the ground in Europe and also the longest and fastest in Europe, being over a mile



My wife Elaine and I set off from home at 8.45am on Thursday 11th September, armed with an AA route and bright sunshine we made our way to North Wales. The route should have been just over four hours but because of roadworks and diversions actually took over five hours causing me to be driving through the Welsh countryside at breakneck speed just to arrive on time. Thankfully we made it, although with only twenty minutes to spare.

The venue was spectacular but the weather had turned cloudy and most of the mountains were shrouded in mist. Having kitted up, the other zip sliders and I were sent down a short(ish) zip slide and then given a guided tour of the quarry where we learnt that only 10% of the slate quarried was usable for splitting. Then it was off to the main Zip Wire. I had previously bought a digital video camera to capture the event but soon realised that it was not practical to hold it whilst doing the slide so I hired a head cam and left Elaine to use the video camera. Unfortunately I forgot to show her how to use the zoom so all she could do was get a long distance view of me flying through the air. The experience was unforgettable as I hurtled over the lake in the bottom of the quarry and over the top of the trees around the perimeter. From my perspective it was a wonderful day and I was able to raise over £1,000 for the Friends.
