Colin's Story

Sarah Brooks, a former Trustee at *BCDH* for many years, is also a foster carer to some of the Home's numerous dogs in need of extra care. Sarah finds fostering hugely rewarding although the inevitable 'puppy attachment' makes it a real wrench when the time comes to return the puppy to the Home so that it can be offered for adoption. There is always the desire, says Sarah, to simply keep the puppy but that is not always practicable, as Sarah has learnt, when you have already given a home to several dogs that were only meant to be temporary residents!

The latest dog that Sarah and her family are fostering is Colin the Collie pup. When he was five and half weeks old, his farmer/breeder owner decided to have him put to sleep as he was suffering from carpel laxity syndrome of the left foreleg which meant he was worthless as a working dog. Fortunately for Colin, the vet in Wales thought his condition might resolve itself and asked for Colin to be given a chance should a place be found for him at a rescue centre. Lynda Pearce's friend Gail took him on and then he came to *BCDH* via Lynda, once it had been agreed that Colin would be fostered by Sarah and her family.

Although Sarah has learnt to resist the temptation of adopting every foster dog that comes through her door, she readily admits that Colin has already stolen her family's heart and has unquestionably found himself his own forever home. Sarah jokes that the Home would categorise her as a 'failed fosterer' this time! But having Colin will not stop Sarah and her family from fostering again – if anything it will make life easier as Colin will have other dogs to play with and learn from. It is heartening to think that after such a poor start in life Colin has a loving home and such a happy ending.

Well, who can resist that? It made me want him a little bit more! He was a fouryear-old Dutch rabbit called Paddy. The bond was instant: Florrie had picked her man. So Paddy came home! He seemed unsure of his surroundings at first, but

Treasurer's Report

Dear Friends

First, I would like to acknowledge the amount of work my fellow Trustees have undertaken during the year with a number of voluntary activities that raised funds for the *Friends*, all giving their time willingly and unpaid to help increase the funds available to the *Friends*.

The Trustees decided that it was important to have a written investment policy in place to dictate how the Friends invests its funds and how the income arising from these investments, as well as the monies raised from other voluntary activities, are distributed. An investment committee comprising myself, Robin Eastman and Nick Burgess was formed and it presented a proposal to the other Trustees that the *Friends* should develop a sustainable income flow that would benefit BCDH into the foreseeable future. The aim is to distribute a minimum of 90% of its income prior to any legacies received during the year and for the legacies to be used to grow and

build the investment portfolio to increase the amount of income available in the future. Hargreaves Lansdown has been appointed to manage these funds in line with our investment policy. Along with a focus on building the *Friends* membership base and continuing the voluntary activities, we believe this structuring will provide a sustainable stream of income for the *Friends* to provide grants to *BCDH* to support their activities.

Legacies continue to be a mainstay of our income, comprising 88% in 2015 and 82% in 2014. During the year we donated \pounds 97K to *BCDH*, which is 32% of our 2015 income (34% in 2014). To put it in perspective, this grant was 230% more than our regular income before taking into account legacies. Obviously, if we continue to grant more than our regular income and we fail to attract any further legacies, the *Friends* will ultimately cease to exist.
